Dear Mrs Gautam,



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The Phoenix in the Forests

As the world fights the irrational threats of various wars and nukes, Brazil has been fighting a war of its own, against a wave of fires that have broken out in the Amazon forests, the 'Lungs of the World.'

Producing more than 20% of the world's oxygen, the Amazon rainforests span over nine different countries and cover a majority of the continent of South America. Studies show that the 2.2 million-square mile rainforest is nearing its nadir as large fragmented portions of the rainforest could develop into an entirely different ecosystem, leading to the acceleration of climate change, loss of countless species, and disaster for the indigenous populations that call the tropical rainforests their home.

Brazil's National Institute for Space Research (INPE) has reported at least 74,000 fires in the Amazon within this year. This is an increase by 84 percent as compared to last year. The most appalling aspect of these massive forest fires is that unlike the United States and Canada, where many wildfires are ignited by lightning strikes during the summer, large fires are not a typical natural occurrence in the Amazon, particularly during non-drought years such as 2019.

Most fires in the Amazon are caused by humans, set either accidentally or intentionally. This basically means that miles of the world's largest ecosystem go up in smoke because of one man's carelessly thrown cigarette or his want for more.

Many are accusing President Jair Bolsonaro for the raging fires as he had cut the budget for the IBAMA (Brazil's Environmental Agency) by 24 percent in April this year. Nevertheless, recently the G7 countries have proposed to aid Brazil by providing 22 million dollars. However, Brazil has rejected this offer.

However undisturbed we might be by sitting on the other side of the world, just hearing facts alone makes us realise that the situation in the Amazon is grave as the rainforest, with all its plants, animals and soils, is an enormous reservoir of carbon. However, as it degrades due to deforestation and climate change, it will switch from soaking up carbon dioxide in the atmosphere to becoming a net emitter of heat-trapping gases. There is about 90 billion metric tons of carbon embedded in the Amazon, equal to about a decade's worth of greenhouse gas emissions. So losing the rainforest holds the potential to cause global warming by about 24% which in return will have its own consequences.

We are living on this planet as if we have another one to go to. It is time we realize that we have not inherited this planet form our ancestors but have borrowed it from the future generations and therefore for our children to tread on better earth, we must all come together and stop this exploitation.



Chasing The Moon *India's expedition to the dark side*

'Chandrayaan-2' is an Indian Lunar Mission that boldly ventured to where no other country had been before, the *Moon's South Polar Region*. The Lunar South Pole is especially interesting because of the lunar surface area here, that remains in shadow, is much larger than the North Pole with a possibility of the presence of water. The GeoSynchronous Satellite Launch Vehicle Mark-III (GSLV MK-III) carried 'Chandrayaan-2' to its designated orbit. GSLV's components included S200 solid rocket boosters, L110 liquid stage and C25 upper stage. The Chandrayaan-2 Lunar Module consists of The Lunar Orbiter, the lander, Vikram and the rover, Pragyan.

The lander Vikram is named after Dr. Vikram A. Sarabhai, the father of the Indian Space Programme and the rover Pragyan translates to 'wisdom' in Sanskrit. ISRO made history by launching this mission on the 22nd of July, 2019 at 2.43 pm from Satish Dhawan Space Centre, Sriharikota. The Orbiter will be operational for a year and the rover and lander will be operational for one Lunar Day (14 Earth Days). The Lander carrying Pragyan was supposed to 'soft land' on the lunar surface on the 27th of September, 2019 at around 1.50 am, but lost connections with ISRO's Mission Control Centre. The lander could not have a soft landing but did manage to successfully land. Scientists have stated that both-the lander and the rover are healthy and are functioning properly due to the efficiently programmed on-board autonomy. However they are still trying to establish communications. This mission is just another milestone that India has achieved. ISRO is now looking forward to launch missions 'Gaganyaan' and 'Mangalyaan-2' in 2021. JAXA and ISRO have also planned to launch 'Chandrayaan-3' in the next three years.

Before 1914 the southern American border between El Paso and Juarez was unrestricted, which meant no passports, jobs on both sides and back and forth movement twice a day. Come 1916, Mexico was expecting an attack from the allies and the flow to the north of the border to a welcoming country was heavier than ever.

This was followed by the Eugenics movement, a concept based on junk science that aimed at creating a genetically and morally superior race of people. Now the border was a tragic sight with masses of people waiting for the 'US government to decide if they were fit enough to deserve entry.'


We're talking about the beginning of Hispanic racism, the inculcation of a sentiment that had so far been nonexistent in the social fabric. The government appointed health officials trained at weeding out immigrants

they thought unsuitable or disease carriers. This is when movies came forth with the derogatory term "Greaser" and throughout the nation Mexicans were stereotyped as dirty and inferior. The scenario that set the stage for the rise of El Paso's next mayor Tom Lea was now here. He was a man who had his mind set on "purity" and not just physical purity but also racial purity. Lea drove his point home with the establishment of a disinfection plant at the border, the first of its kind in the world.

The plants were brutal in their procedures. Lea was obsessed with the eradication of Typhus that came with lice and so these immigrants were made to strip naked after which the officers would examine every part of their body. If they had lice, they would have to bathe in kerosene and vinegar. The practice would be repeated every eight days and was followed in the prisons in the following year. Somebody once lit a match and the tragedy that followed was labelled "Jail holocaust". Another method was that of spraying DDT, onto the skin of every migrant that crossed the border, a "miraculous white powder" as the Americans called it which decades later would be banned by most developed countries. No one talked about it; it was all kept buried, a symptom of the psychology of shame. Ironically enough the chemical they used in these gas chambers became the building block for the ones in Nazi Germany, a truth the oldest democracy in the world will never accept.

We suggest the next thing you do after reading this article is to find Fox News and you will be presented with a rerun of the thought process that was predominant in these times- 'imbeciles', 'dirty', 'diseases'. Apprehensions in the El Paso area have risen 600% since the switch form the Obama Presidency. Mexican children are essentially being warehoused with as many as 300 kids in a cell without adequate food, water or sanitation. Hundreds of migrants have been huddled in these makeshift detention centres waiting to find out if the 'US government deems them fit enough for entry.' 

Redefining Machiavelli: The Distorted Truth

"Machiavellian" denotes a person or action that disregards morality and is wholly self-serving. The origin of the word derives from the famous Florentine politician and writer Niccoló Machiavelli.

The global scenario today is to a great extent divorced from morality, mutual benefits and customs, and works on the grounds of power, selfish interests and individual good. These traits can be witnessed in China's neo-colonialism in Africa, U.S mediation in the Middle-East to establish "peace" or even the politicization of events backed by religion and tradition in several countries, including India.

The continuance of unopposed terrorist and fatal government rule in many countries like Syria, Sudan, and Venezuela clearly reflects the Machiavellian concept of "effectual truth" where what *really* is, is far different from what really *should* be. These States legitimize the teachings of Machiavelli where the disconcerting fact remains – the ruler must adopt any evil tactics to stay in power. This is further justified by the misleading pessimistic nature of humankind as defined by Machiavelli – selfish, brute, merciless and dishonest. When we speak of racial and ethnic discrimination, non-state actors get a fresh mandate to carry out atrocities. that humanity has grown more peaceful, but I don't believe that is true. It is just that rulers and perpetrators have definitely become better at justifying war and their actions.

Unfortunately, when one begins to step away from the political scenario and begins to apply this principle to the various other aspects of an individual's life, one discovers that being Machiavelli may be better than being a Gandhi. It begins to seem like a necessity when minute after minute we see friends transform to strangers and find abandonment completely normal. The ever-growing gap between the rich and the poor gives a license to the criminals to break law. Influence and popularity become the driving force of everyone's regular life and trust is not a commonly uttered word. The most disturbing idea is the validation of acquisitiveness in the pursuit of happiness. The virtues taught are incompatible with the actuality of practice to preserve ourselves. To survive in this despotic world, must we not become the same?

The odious maxims of a Machiavellian policy become our daily mantra, whether we realize it or not. If one would ask Machiavelli what he thinks of our contemporary world, he would smile that famous inscrutable smile of his and surely say – "This looks familiar, doesn't it?"

Knowing this, are we supposed to sit back in our couches, pretending to be oblivious and simply *accept* this way of life as something that's ubiquitous? Or should we, as rational people stand up against an intolerable happening in our society and understand that there are never easy choices, and prudence consists in knowing how to recognize the challenges of the hard decisions you face yet choosing the harder right.

Even now, as I sit to write my utopian notions, I know for sure that the society has already given birth to many Machiavellis and no one is sure as to what the consequences of this would be for us. Fortunately or unfortunately, the only thing we can do is to have faith in mankind's inherent goodness. Or is it not?


